

Seven Frosh Disciplined For Alcohol Infractions

Infractions of the University's alcoholic beverages policy by seven freshmen head the list of 15 disciplinary actions for the months of December and January.

The composite report, issued by the Dean of Students, the Dean of Student Life, the Director of Residence Halls, and the Committee on Discipline, lists eight offenses of the alcoholic code as the basis for action.

A freshman in Arts-Engineering, and two freshman engineers were "warned and formally reprimanded for possession of alcoholic beverage in direct violation of University regulations prohibiting such possession."

Another freshman engineer was "warned and assessed one University demerit for possession and consumption of alcoholic beverage in direct violation of University regulations prohibiting such possession and consumption." A jun-

ior in chemical engineering was "formally reprimanded for ungentlemanly conduct, including drunkenness."

"For the purchase and possession of alcoholic beverages in direct violation of University regulations prohibiting such purchase and possession," a freshman engineer was "warned and assessed one University disciplinary demerit." Another freshman engineer was "warned and formally reprimanded" for the same offense.

A frosh engineer was warned and assessed two University disciplinary demerits "for purchase and possession and consumption of alcoholic beverage in direct violation of University regulations prohibiting such purchase, possession, and consumption."

"For operating a motor vehicle on University property when ineligible to do so," a sophomore Engineer and a business sophomore were each "assessed one disciplinary demerit and continued

under sophomore regulations indefinitely."

A business sophomore and an Arts sophomore were "formally reprimanded and assessed one disciplinary demerit for disregard of University Trustee Regulations prohibiting the registration of a motor vehicle."

"For disregard of Lehigh University's social regulations," an arts sophomore was "formally reprimanded and assessed one disciplinary demerit."

An industrial engineering sophomore was "formally reprimanded and assessed one disciplinary demerit for operating a motor vehicle on University property when ineligible to do so."

A sophomore in the College of Business Administration was "formally reprimanded and assessed one disciplinary demerit for disregard of University Trustee Regulation of October 5, 1964, prohibiting the registration of a motor vehicle."

Latins & Shakespeare

Varied Art Show Opened

"The cultural approach to understanding among nations can provide the initiative to establish a cultural bridge between them" Raul Quijano, minister plenipotentiary from Argentina to the United Nations said.

Senor Quijano was among the distinguished guests attending a reception on Sunday which officially opened this month's art exhibition in the Alumni Memorial Building.

The exhibition includes oils, watercolors and graphics by South American artists, and Shakespearean illustrations and oils by the late Willy Pogany.

The South American exhibition is part of a collection acquired by Muriel and Philip Berman of Allentown during a trip to South America as representatives of the U. S. State Department.

Lehigh's exhibition is the first showing of the paintings in America and is intended to create better understanding of the cultural aspects of South American countries.

Nemesio Antunez, who is presently cultural attache to the Chilean embassy in Washington, is represented by five large canvases.

Santos Chavez, another artist represented, is a pure-blooded

Indian who was a goatherd in the Andes Mountains. He developed his lithograph style in Santiago, Chile.

Chavez' woodcuts and engravings show a simplicity and a feeling for nature. His "Creator of My People" contains a delicately executed goat which is also present in several other of his woodcuts.

Other works represent a wide variety of South American painters and portray various geographic and ethnic characteristics.

Across the hall from the Berman exhibit is a series of 21 Shakespearean illustrations by Pogany. These colorful drawings have been used as illustrations in editions of Shakespeare's works.

Pogany's illustrations are both delightful and informative to anyone who is even slightly familiar with Shakespeare. They are a gay pageant of laughing and dancing characters as well as serious and grieving poor folk, princes and kings.

Pogany painted "Don Quixote and the New World" when he first came to America as his own projected view of what New York might look like in the future.
